

clinical hepatology. Extensive information regarding basic anatomy, physiology, biochemistry, immunology, and genetics, investigative methods such as radiology and imaging and general pathology occupy a quarter of the book. Diseases of the liver are reviewed in the rest of the book and these chapters are generally good.

Clinicians will appreciate excellent reviews of portal hypertension, which includes an interesting description of the venous anatomy in this condition, and ascites where there is a good review of current treatment. There is an extensive and generally good section on infectious diseases supplemented by an appendix giving useful information on the geographic distribution of these diseases. Pyogenic liver abscesses, however, are treated rather superficially and received no more consideration than, for example, melioidosis which seems a little imbalanced.

The book ends with interesting chapters on the effects of liver disease on other body systems, the effects of disease in other systems on the liver, and the effects of old age on the liver and its diseases. The appendices include an interesting compilation of chemical liver toxins which should be useful to those seeing patients found to have asymptomatic abnormal liver function tests possibly related to their occupations.

The substantial and comprehensive index helps greatly in tracing relevant material on specific topics through the book, but greater cross referencing would have been a major help to readers and might have prevented duplication of material. It is too much to expect that a book written by so many contributors would have a uniform style but, in general, variation is not too marked and sections are overall well referenced.

This very good book compares well with other available reference texts devoted to the liver and its diseases. Individual physicians will blanch at its cost, but it should be displayed prominently in all medical libraries.

Paediatric gastroenterology. By J Navarro and J Schmitz. (Pp 547; illustrated; £80.) Oxford: Oxford University Press, 1992.

A translation into English of the most authoritative French text on paediatric gastroenterology has been published. The two distinguished authors are internationally recognised on this subject. The book, as a result, provides a

comprehensive account of the whole field viewed from a French perspective but with an international bibliography significantly based on English language publications.

A comprehensive account of the development of the digestive system is given as well as a detailed description of the diseases which affect the oesophagus, stomach, small and large intestine, and the pancreas. There is a separate chapter on disorders which require surgical treatment. The symptomatology of gastrointestinal diseases in children is discussed and investigational and therapeutic techniques are dealt with in separate sections.

Clearly there has been some delay in publishing this text in English and as a result it is not completely up to date. This is no doubt the reason for the failure to discuss *Helicobacter pylori* gastritis in the chapter devoted to gastritis. This book, however, provides a useful European addition to the rapidly expanding literature of paediatric gastroenterology.
